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## Lone Star Corvette Classic At Texas Motor Speedway

Well we're back from a fun filled weekend at Texas Motor Speedway in Fort Worth, TX that took place May 13, 14 and 15. We, Dan & Janet Gallineau, took our 2006 C6 silver convertible. My son Danny Gallineau drove the 2007 Z06 Ron Fellows, which we both own and Dallas Pebbles took his 2005 C6 Vert. Friday afternoon we wanted to autocross in our Z06 to try out the new PFADT coilovers put on a couple weeks ago at Butch's house, but the rain stopped that. That evening we attended a BBQ at the Lone Star Club house at the motor speedway with Hooter girls greeting you at the door with hot wings, very yummy! After the BBQ we all lined up for a parade around the speedway and on the track.

Saturday morning 8 am we all entered the speedway at gate 6 to get our assigned spot under the stands at TMS for the judged car show. Once you are in you cannot leave until 4 pm, but lots of cars to look at. There were probably around 550-600 cars and plenty of vendors. You can put your car in the show and shine or be judged. The club cars were voted by non-club members. Another nice venue is they have spots for couple's car display, which is judged. NCRS judged around 20 cars which were separate from the rest of the cars. If you get bored you can always pay for a ride with the Texas driving school C5 Vettes around the track. I was told they reach speeds of around 150 MPH, enough to get your pants wet, Ha!!!

Saturday night they had a dinner buffet and awards ceremony held in the hotel. Lone Star Corvette Club had plenty of guest speakers such as Will Cooksey and Dick Guldstrand to warm up the crowd.

They gave out 1st place only for show and shine class awards and 1st and 2nd for class judges awards. Janet walked away with 1<sup>st</sup> place in class C6 convertible 2005-2010. Dallas won 2<sup>nd</sup> place. The judges pick out one for best in show for paint, interior and engine and Janet took BEST IN SHOW ENGINE. This was such an honor having that many Corvettes to compete against. I can tell you, Janet's very proud of the award! The awards are made out of acrylic in the shape of Texas, very professional looking and different. Lone Star Club changes their plaques or trophies up every year so they are never the same, always different. Everyone received a large magnet in the shape of Texas with last year's Best of Show on it when you came in Saturday morning.

Sunday morning we attended the track events 1-1/2 mile hot laps, 3-4 laps at a time or you could race in the inside road course, that's for the serious drivers. Janet and I, my son, Danny, and Dallas did hot laps which are a blast. We've been on this track 5-6 times already and it just gets better every year. Laps run from 8:30 am till 5 pm except for 1 hour lunch break and the later you stay the laps get faster. We always leave around 11 am, long drive back to Pineville.

We will have to go back there for another fun adventure really soon.

## WORLD WAR II ADVENTURE

On Saturday, June 10th, Felix Famularo and Mary Berkowitz, the President of the Crescent City Corvette Club, planned an awesome adventure that could not be described without using such words as fun, educational, historical, thought-provoking, and patriotic. It truly made you feel proud to be an American, and to have the utmost respect for our military personnel throughout the history of our great country. It also made you feel a sense of pride for our men and women who are giving their time, and unfortunately, their lives to fight in this dreadful Middle East War.

The day started out with a group of us meeting at the Basin Street Station Visitor Information Center. This was a really nice “museum” with maps of the city of New Orleans, a tribute to the great Jazz and Blues singers, such as Jellyroll Morton, Fats Domino, Louis Armstrong, and many others who shaped our musical history and culture. There was a large mural of Canal Street with the original Basin Street Station located next to the Saenger Theatre, and a great little gift shop, too. The gift shop held many books about New Orleans and even some about the Voodoo culture, hauntings, and ghosts of the area, and surrounding plantations. One special book that I bought was called, “New Orleans, a City of Desire.” It was a pictorial love story to the architecture, and beautiful sights that the Crescent City abounds in.

Following our tour and shopping experience, we headed over to Lucy’s Retired Surfer’s Restaurant and had some delicious fare, such as Juicy Lucy burgers, quesadillas, seafood and many other tasty fares. The restaurant was decorated with surfboards and had a beautiful view of Tchoupitoulas Street and the buildings and balconies. Many of the locals and tourists thought that the view at Lucy’s was even more beautiful, with our fantastic, colorful Corvettes lining the street in front of Lucy’s and the surrounding areas. Many people stood along the side of the streets to take pictures of our “babies,” too.

After a great dining experience at Lucy’s, we made a mini parade heading to the World War II Museum complex. The Museum is really well organized, and holds several floors of memorabilia, authentic uniforms, rifles, guns, movies, and pictures of the events that led up to and were taking place during World War II. The main entrance was breathtaking with a huge bomber, and propeller planes “hanging” from the high ceiling. There were tanks, a Higgins boat, and other war equipment displayed in a great manner.

As you visited each floor of the museum, you could feel the heroism, pride, and bravery that our military men and ladies had throughout that dreadful time in our country’s history. There were also many tributes to the countless civilians who took care of the war efforts here in the U. S. (and to Rosie the Riveter) who built so many planes, tanks, and supplies needed by our heroes fighting the war. I cannot say enough about how well this museum displays the historical items, pictures, posters, and war equipment. I especially enjoyed one of the movies about the building of the Higgins boats right here in our region. Harry Connick, Jr. narrated the short film, as only he could, with his sweet “Naturally Nawlins” accent!

Following our tour of the fabulous museum, and our shopping experience at the gift shop, we crossed the street to enter the second phase of the museum experience and visited another complex which housed the John Besh Stage Door Canteen Dinner Theatre and viewed a heart-stopping 3-D IMAX movie, narrated by Tom Hanks, in the Solomon Victory Theatre. The movie was incredible, with the 3-D effects and props that dropped and were suspended from the ceiling to further authenticate the pictures and movie presentations. There was snow, rain, and rumbling seats to let us feel the tanks, planes, and bombs blasting in the film. It was a somber reflection, thoughtful, honest, and an often sentimental depiction of the war that took us “Beyond All Boundaries.” There were not many dry eyes when the film showed the atrocities perpetrated by the evil Hitler, Hirohito, and Mussolini. The saying, “If you do not learn from history, you are destined to repeat it”, could not be more meaningful at this crucial time in our nation’s history.

After the movie, we headed to the Stage Door Canteen to partake in delicious, gourmet meals under the culinary direction of John Besh. For our first course, we had a choice of crabmeat pot pie, (which was beyond delicious!), chilled cucumber soup with lobster, or heirloom tomato salad with mozzarella. The second course had selections of roast pork, pan seared grouper, slow cooked beef ribs, or trout amandine, not almondine, which was topped with lump crabmeat and brown butter. It was fantastic!! For dessert, we could choose from chocolate cake with coffee buttercream inserts, strawberry shortcake, or honey lavender Bavarian citrus soup. Most of us got the chocolate cake or strawberry shortcake. Everything was delicious and presented in an elegant manner.

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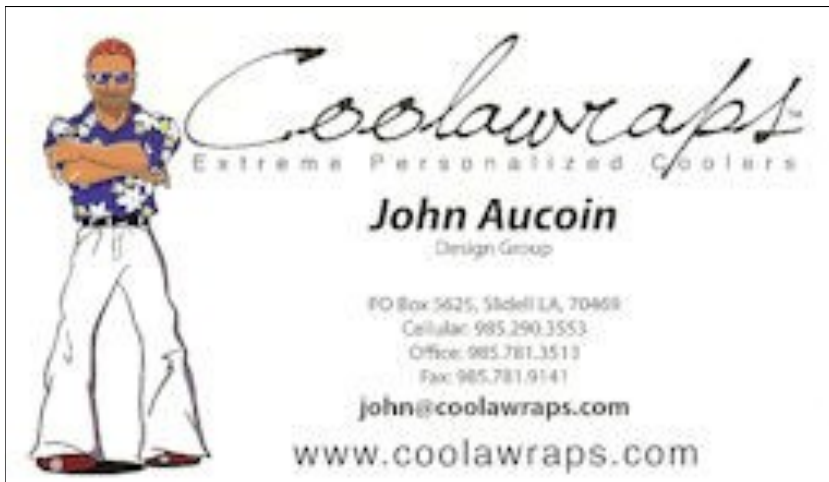
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
